PRELIMINARY FACT SHEET FOR 2007-2008

- The Indiana University School of Medicine is located at nine sites throughout Indiana. Eight sites offer the first two years of medical school and are in Bloomington, Evansville, Fort Wayne, Gary, Muncie, South Bend, Terre Haute and West Lafayette. All students are in Indianapolis for the final two years, which focus on clinical rotations in six affiliated hospitals.
- IU School of Medicine educates the second largest medical student body in the U.S.
- The IU School of Medicine student body represents 54 of the 92 Indiana counties and 91 colleges and universities.
- IU faculty has performed many “firsts” in Indiana including transplants of the kidney, liver, cornea, bone marrow, pancreas, and infant and newborn hearts.
- Approximately half of Indiana’s physicians received all or some of their education at the IU School of Medicine.
- IU School of Medicine has more than 60 clinical departments and specialty divisions.
- Nearly half of IU School of Medicine graduates accept in-state residencies.
- Nearly 40 percent of IU School of Medicine graduates enter primary care specialties.

INDIANA UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE TIMELINE

1903	IU School of Medicine is established in Bloomington, Indiana
1906	Third-year medical students begin clinical study in Indianapolis.
1911	First courses in medical social work are offered.
1914	Long Hospital, the first IU hospital, is dedicated.
1915	IU Continuing Medical Education (CME) program begins.
1919	Medical School Building, now Emerson Hall, opens.
1920	IU School of Medicine freshman class reaches 100 - among largest in the U.S.
1924	Riley Memorial Association opens James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children and grants ownership to IU.
1928	Coleman Hospital for Women opens, the first Indiana hospital exclusively for obstetrics and gynecology.
1933	Department of Medical Illustrations established.
1952	Roudebush VA Medical Center opens; staffed by IU physicians. LaRue Carter Hospital opens; staffed by IU physicians.
1956	Institute for Psychiatric Research is dedicated.
1958	Medical Science Building opens, later re-named after John VanNuys, MD, dean, 1947-1964. IU School of Medicine moves to Indianapolis.
1959	IU School of Medicine establishes the Division of Allied Health Sciences. Medical Sciences Program established in Bloomington, Indiana.
1963	Krannert Institute of Cardiology is dedicated.
1967	Regenstrief Institute for Health Care is established.
1970	Indiana University Hospital opens.
1971	National Institutes of Health funds the Hypertension Research Center. Statewide Medical Education Centers established.
1974	IU Distinguished Professor Lawrence Einhorn, MD, pioneers cure for testicular cancer.
1975	IU School of Medicine assumes management of Wishard Memorial Hospital.
1977	National Institutes of Health funds Diabetes Research and Training Center. National Institutes of Health funds Multipurpose Arthritis and Musculoskeletal Diseases Center.
1983	IU School of Medicine awarded fiscal and medical control of Wishard Memorial Hospital. IU School of Medicine opens Elks Cancer Research Center.

1987	National Institutes of Health funds Alcohol Research Center at IU School of Medicine. Walther Oncology Center established.
1989	Medical Research and Ruth Lilly Library Building is dedicated.
1990	Herman B Wells Center for Pediatric Research is dedicated. Bowen Research Center established. National Institutes of Health funds Midwest Sexually Transmitted Disease Collaborative Research Center.
1991	National Institutes of Health funds Indiana University Alzheimer Disease Center.
1995	National Institutes of Health establishes a National Gene Vector Laboratory at IU School of Medicine.
1996	Indiana Cancer Pavilion is dedicated.
1997	IU Hospital and Riley Hospital for Children consolidate with Methodist Hospital of Indiana to form Clarian Health Indiana University Center for Aging Research opens. Department of Health and Human Services funds National Center of Excellence in Women's Health at IU. Indiana University Cancer Research Institute is dedicated.
1998	IU School of Medicine establishes Department of Public Health.
1999	IU Cancer Center receives National Cancer Institute designation.
2000	Riley Hospital for Children opens Riley Outpatient Center. Indiana Genomics Initiative formed with \$105 million grant from Lilly Endowment.
2001	IU Center for Bioethics established on IUPUI campus.
2003	Biotechnology Research and Training Center and Research II buildings open.
2005	IUSM-South Bend opens new center with University of Notre Dame. IU School of Medicine and Clarian Health begin expansion of IU Simon Cancer Center.
2006	The Fairbanks Institute is established by BioCrossroads with IU School of Medicine and Regenstrief Institute.
2007	Health Information and Translational Sciences building dedicated; this extends the IUSM campus to the Indianapolis Central Canal. The first class of PhD students enter the Indiana BioMedical Gateway Program.
